INTRODUCTION

Each year Bureau geologists visit many mining properties in Montana in addition to work on their regular field projects. As it is not possible to visit in person all properties in the state during the year, information is requested from Montana mine operators and owners relating to their mining activities. The responses to this canvassing and personal interviews are then compiled and published annually in our Directory of Mining Enterprises.

Mining enterprises are listed systematically in categories in the main body of the Directory, either under Metal Mines or under Nonmetal Mines, Pits, and Quarries. In order, these categories are kind of ore or mineral produced; county in which the mine is situated; and the name of the mine. Additional information includes location of the property based on legal subdivisions of land survey; type of ore mined; mining district in which the property is situated; number of employees; mill capacity, if any; operator's name and address; owner's name and address; and yearly status, i.e., whether the property produced ore during the year, is still producing ore, was developed without any production, or remained totally inactive. To facilitate looking up a mining enterprise if only the name is known, an index of mine names is included at the back of the Directory.

The Directory also contains a list of presently inactive mines. The list is not a complete one, as it is not possible to list all such mining properties in Montana in a publication this size. For this reason, the list is a compilation of only those properties that have undergone development work or have produced ore within recent years but were inactive for a period of more than one year. Mines inactive for a period of three consecutive years are dropped entirely from the Directory.

The rest of the Directory contains a list of Montana coal mines active in 1964 and the state coal production report, by Thomas Morgan, State Coal Mine Inspector, and a report entitled The Mineral Industry of Montana in 1964, by R. W. Knostman and W. N. Hale, of the Bureau of Mines, U. S. Department of the Interior, Region I.

The author wishes to thank the many Montana mine owners and operators for allowing information on their activities to be published. Special acknowledgment is due Mr. Morgan and Mr. Knostman and Mr. Hale for their part in this publication.

Every effort has been made to publish exact and complete information. The fact that a property is listed in the Directory, however, is not to be regarded as an endorsement of the property by the Montana Bureau of Mines and Geology. Conversely, if a property is omitted from the Directory, the omission is not to be taken as questioning its value or future. Such omissions are known to occur, but most are traceable to failure by the last known operator to respond to repeated requests for necessary information. Nevertheless, in most such cases, the missing data have been supplied from the best sources available.

If any additional facts or corrections can be provided, please submit such information to the Montana Bureau of Mines and Geology, Butte, Montana. Your help is needed to keep this yearly publication as authoritative as possible.

THE MINERAL INDUSTRY OF MONTANA IN 1964

Preliminary Annual Report

The value of mineral production (\$205 million) in Montana exceeded \$200 million for the second time in the history of the State, according to a preliminary report by the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. The near record output value, second only to that of 1956 (\$213.8 million), was \$23.0 million (13 percent) above the corresponding 1963 figure. Copper output accounted for a major portion of the increase as production jumped 31 percent and the value rose \$18.6 million because of the completion of a 42,000-ton-per-day copper concentrator at Butte and the resumption of near-normal operations by The Anaconda Company. Gold and silver output and value increased, and the value of lead and zinc production rose despite a drop in output below 1963 levels.

Petroleum (\$74.8 million) and copper (\$67.8 million) accounted for 70 percent of the total value of mineral production.

Output of mineral fuels and many nonmetal products remained approximately the same as in the previous year, but gains in cement, lime, fluorspar, peat, and phosphate rock were recorded; barite and stone production declined.

The Anaconda Company continued to ship low-grade manganese ore from the former Government stockpile, purchased in 1962, to Anaconda for concentrating and recovery of contained manganese and base metals.

The rising demand for silver resulted in an increased number of exploration and development projects. Office of Minerals Exploration (OME) loans were granted for work at potential silver-bearing properties in Beaverhead, Silver Bow, and Madison Counties. Major exploration projects were in progress in the Flathead mining district, at the Crystal property in Jefferson County, and at the Champion mine in Deer Lodge County.

IFMID Important nonmetal developments included petroleum refinery expansion, construction of a phosphate rock concentrator, and development of a silica deposit. Capacity expansions at the two petroleum refineries at Billings were accompanied by added facilities for recovering sulfur at the Montana Sulphur & Chemical Co. plant, Billings. The Douglas Creek phosphate mine flotation concentrator, Granite County, was completed and placed into operation; phosphate rock was upgraded and shipped to company fertilizer plants at Trail and Kimberley, British Columbia. Pacific Silica Co. leased the Basin silica deposit, Jefferson County, from Union Carbide Co. and began developing the property.

Montana industry employment reached record proportions during the year as the rising economic climate brought demands for an increased labor supply. Despite a drop in the petroleum and natural gas industry, the overall mining employment total for the first 10 months of 1964 (figures for November and December are not available) averaged 6 percent above that of the corresponding period in 1963, according to the Montana Labor Market. The 20-percent increase in metal mining industry employment resulted from the strong demand for miners at Butte district mines of The Anaconda Company.

Anaconda continued to experience a shortage of miners despite steps taken to recruit and train personnel. Efforts to obtain unemployed miners from former coal-mining regions of Appalachia resulted in several hundred men finding jobs in Butte mines. In addition, the company trained over 260 men from southwestern Montana as student miners.

The displacement of workers caused by the cessation of copper concentrating at Anaconda on October 30 seriously affected the community. Many workers commuted from Anaconda to jobs at the new Butte concentrator, but the highly automated operation at Butte required fewer men than did the Anaconda concentrator. Approximately \$675,000 in Government funds were allotted for training former mill workers for other occupations.

REVIEW BY MINERAL COMMODITIES

METALS

Aluminum. - Anaconda Aluminum Co. operated its Columbia Falls primary aluminum plant at capacity (approximately 67,500 tons annually) for the third consecutive year. Construction of a third potline to increase annual capacity to 100,000 tons was continued. Operation of the new potline was scheduled to begin in the third quarter of 1965.

Copper. - Estimated copper output jumped 31 percent (24,840 tons) over the 1963 total owing to the completion of a new 42,000-ton-per-day copper mill (Clyde E. Weed Concentrator) at Butte and increased production from Butte district mines. The 1963 output was depressed because the equipment transfer from the mill at Anaconda to the Butte concentrator necessitated curtailed mine production. Output at the new concentrator was gradually increased throughout the year until sufficient capacity was attained to handle all copper ore from Butte mines, thus bringing about closure of the copper concentrator at Anaconda on October 30.

Completion of the new concentrator, containing both LPF (leach-precipitation-flotation) and straight flotation circuits, was a major step toward returning Montana copper operations of The Anaconda Company to production and profit levels of previous years. Operating methods and equipment at the new facility were reported in three publications. 1/2/3

The Butte deep level program to tap high-grade reserves at depth and to improve hauling and hoisting facilities was continued at a rapid rate. The Kelley No. 1 shaft (36 feet by 7 feet) was deepened to 5,847 feet; upon completion of connecting haulageways, the shaft was to be used for centralized hoisting from deep levels of the Mountain Con, Leonard, and Steward mines. Four of the five compartments of the shaft were to be equipped with hoisting skips, thus providing the capacity to raise more than 7,000 tons per day from the 4600 level. Over 1,000 feet of the planned 1,650-foot, 4600-level haulageway from the Mountain Con mine to the Kelley No. 1 shaft was completed. A connection from this haulageway was ultimately to provide passage to the

Steward mine. Haulageways were planned to connect the shaft with the 4200 level of the Leonard and Belmont mines. All haulageways were to be of sufficient size to accommodate 36-inch gauge track and 120-cubic-foot cars with a capacity of 5 tons.

Deepening of the Kelley No. 2 shaft to a depth of 939 feet below the 3000 level was begun late in the year. Upon completion, the shaft was to replace the High Ore shaft as the central pump shaft for the district. Replacement of the High Ore shaft, located near the edge of the Berkeley pit, was necessary because of a planned pit expansion. Sinking of the circular Neversweat inclined (69 degrees) shaft was continued by Centennial Development Co. The shaft was intended mainly for ventilation of the Steward mine.

Experimental leaching of Berkeley pit low-grade material containing 0.1 to 0.4 percent copper was begun in January. Leach ore was piled on an impervious asphalt pad $(3\frac{1}{4})$ inches thick) designed to minimize the loss of pregnant solutions. Hot water $(85^{\circ}\ F)$ from Butte mines was percolated through the leach dumps before being directed to the precipitation plant for recovery of the copper in solution.

The Anaconda Company and Bear Creek Mining Co., a subsidiary of Kennecott Copper Corp., staked mining claims and leased property aggregating nearly 20,000 acres in the vicinity of the Mike Horse mine near Rogers Pass, Lewis and Clark County. Anaconda drilled several holes that cut zones of low-grade copper.

<u>Gold.</u>- Production of gold, the highest since 1961, increased nearly 9,800 ounces over the 1963 total of 18,520 ounces. As with silver, the increase was largely due to the sharp rise in copper output from which gold was recovered as a byproduct. Approximately 65 percent of the output was as byproduct of copper production by The Anaconda Company.

Vitro Minerals Corp. continued to examine by diamond drilling and other exploration methods a portion of the Judith Mountains near Lewistown.

Iron Ore. - Production of iron ore dropped 44 percent to 7,443 long tons. The output was entirely from the Iron Cross mine near Radersburg, Broadwater County. Ralls & Harris Bros. operated the mine until June 1 when the Harris brothers sold their interest in the company. The mine was worked during the remainder of the year by R & S Iron Co. The Iron Magnet mine, which yielded 3,488 long tons in 1963, was not operated.

Lead. - Estimated production declined 10 percent below the 1963 output, but the value rose 11 percent because of a higher average price for the metal. As in the past, most of the production was a byproduct of zinc output from the Butte district and the slag-fuming operation at East Helena. A major portion of the output was from the Badger State mine (Butte), but lead also was recovered from zinc ore extracted at smaller mining operations throughout the State, from various mine dumps in the Butte district, and from the purchased Government manganese stockpile.

Manganese. - Estimated shipments of both manganese ore and concentrate (35 percent or more manganese) and manganiferous ore and concentrate (5 to 35 percent manganese) were more than triple the 1963 output. The increase in manganese concentrate shipments resulted from a sharp rise in the use of manganese nodules for producing ferromanganese by The Anaconda Company at the Anaconda Reduction Works, Anaconda, Deer Lodge County, and a substantial increase in demand for battery-grade manganese produced by Taylor-Knapp Co. Manganiferous ore production was entirely by Taylor-Knapp Co. from the Moorlight claim group in the Philipsburg district of Granite County.

The Anaconda Company continued shipping from the low-grade manganese stockpile at Butte, purchased from the Government in 1962, to the reduction works for concentrating. More than 60,000 tons of concentrate was produced and piped to the sintering plant for producing manganese nodules. Nodules were shipped for metallurgical and chemical uses and were consumed in the production of ferromanganese. The Anaconda ferromanganese plant was operated approximately 4 months, the first production since 1962.

Battery-grade manganese ore continued to be the major product of Taylor-Knapp Co. This product was best suited for use in dry-cell batteries not requiring a high drain rate, such as those used in flashlights, entrance lights, and blinker lights for construction projects.

Silver. - Estimated production of silver increased nearly 28 percent to 5.4 million ounces, compared with the 1963 total of 4.2 million ounces. Most of the output was as a byproduct of copper (64 percent) and zinc (24 percent) ores in the Butte district, with the remainder largely from miscellaneous shippers to smelters at Anaconda and East Helena.

Interest continued in exploring and developing silver-bearing properties in the State. Champion Silver Mining Co. completed shaft-sinking and cross-cutting at the Champion mine, Deer Lodge County, to develop ore cut previously by diamond drilling. Spokane National Mines, Inc., continued exploration and development at the New Departure mine in the Bannack district and concentrated ore in a flotation mill at Bannack. McIsaac Mining and Tunneling Co., Sudbury, Ontario, began reopening the Mineral King mine near Saltese, but ventilation problems postponed completion of the project. United Buffadison Mines, Ltd., of Toronto, Ontario, continued a diamond-drilling program started in 1963 at the Crystal property near Basin.

The acute silver shortage and price increase resulted in considerable exploration for silver ore in the Hog Heaven (Flathead) district of Flathead County. Midnite Mining Co., Spokane, Wash., began diamond drilling at a property leased by Waino Lindbom and at claims comprising the Ole property. The Anaconda Company conducted geochemical soil sampling and other exploration in the vicinity of the company-owned Flathead mine, and preparations were begun for underground work to check results of the surface examination. The Montana Bureau of Mines and Geology conducted geochemical soil sampling in the area. Northern Pacific Railway Co. continued an appraisal of company-owned land in the region.

Three OME contracts were awarded for silver exploration in the southwestern part of the State. Wayne Erickson received a \$61,500 contract for work in the Elkhorn mining district of Beaverhead County. Work in the Lowland mining district, 40 miles north of Butte, was conducted under a \$132,800 agreement with Ruby Silver Mines, Inc., Salt Lake City, Utah. B.L.M.W. Mining Co. received a \$20,550 contract for exploration in the Fairweather district, Madison County. Government participation was 50 percent of the contract totals.

The Bunker Hill Co. terminated exploration of the Nancy Lee property near Superior after sinking the shaft 400 feet, establishing two new levels, and conducting an intensive ore search during the 3-year period since the mine was leased in July 1961. Bunker Hill mined an average of 75 tons of ore per day just prior to terminating the lease; the ore was trucked to the company concentrator at Kellogg, Idaho. Late in the year, E.C. Smith, former operator of the mine, again leased the property, reactivated the mill, and made several shipments of concentrate to the East Helena smelter.

<u>Thorium</u>. - Interest in thorium-bearing deposits in the Lemhi Pass area was buoyed by the announcement that Dow Chemical Co. had optioned properties in the Idaho portion of the area.

<u>Uranium</u>. - There was no uranium output in the State for the first time since 1956. Production had declined each year since 1959.

Zinc. - A rise in metal price resulted in an 11-percent increase in the value of zinc production despite a 1,900-ton drop in output from that of 1963. As in previous years, most of the production was by The Anaconda Company from operations in the Butte district and from the slag-fuming facility at East Helena. An estimated 9,325 tons was recovered from fuming old slag at East Helena, and about 235 tons came from small mines outside of the Butte district; the remainder of the State total was from dumps, stockpiles, and mines owned by Anaconda.

The largest amount was from block caving low-grade ore at the Badger State mine, but a higher grade sector of the mine was extracted by cut-and-fill stoping methods. Ore also was shipped from the Anselmo mine, Syndicate pit and dump, Orphan Girl dump, and the Emma west dump. Processing ore from the Government low-grade manganese stockpile purchased in 1962 continued to yield significant quantities of zinc.

The Anaconda electrolytic zinc plant at Great Falls was operated at capacity (8 units) in March, but by yearend, production had been curtailed to 6 units due to a shortage of concentrates. The plant was closed by a strike from mid-January to the end of the month by a labor dispute.

Block caving of zinc ore at the Badger State mine was described. 4/

NONMETALS

Asbestos. - Zonolite Division, W.R. Grace & Co., continued experimental recovery of short-fiber tremolite asbestos as a coproduct with vermiculite at an operation near Libby, Lincoln County.

Galaxy Mining Co., Billings, shipped short-fiber anthophyllite asbestos from the Karst property, Gallatin County, to the Colorado School of Mines for testing purposes.

<u>Barite</u>. - Tonnage and value of barite production were estimated to be 55 percent lower than the 1963 totals.

Production was from the Elk Creek mine, Missoula County, by Baroid Sales Division, National Lead Co. Ore was trucked 9 miles from the mine to a stockpile at the Greenough grinding plant. Material was processed according to market demand at the plant, essentially a gravity-concentrating unit with accompanying drying, grinding, and bagging facilities. Processed material, largely used as a weighting agent in oil-well drilling mud, was shipped to Pacific Northwest, Rocky Mountain States, and Alaskan consumers. Coarse quartz and granite-bearing tailings were dug periodically from a settling pond and sold to the State highway department for use in road construction.

<u>Cement</u>. - Quantity and value of cement shipments increased 23 percent compared with 1963 totals.

Production was by Kaiser Cement & Gypsum Corp. (formerly Permanente Cement Co.) at Montana City and by Ideal Cement Co. at Trident. Raw materials for making cement were obtained from quarries adjacent to the plants and from distant sources. Limestone, shale, and silica were mined near the plants. Iron ore used at Trident came from northwestern Montana, and iron-bearing slag used at Montana City was from East Helena. Gypsum for both operations was mined at Fergus County deposits near Lewistown. The Kaiser Cement & Gypsum Corp. Montana City plant was described in a report. 5/

<u>Clays.</u>- Output of both miscellaneous clay and fire clay was estimated to be about the same as the 1963 total. Miscellaneous clay and shale production for use in building products accounted for much of the output; a small quantity of fire clay was dug.

<u>Fluorspar.</u> Output of fluorspar by Roberts Mining Co. at its Ravalli County operation was up sharply. Ore from the Crystal Mountain mine was trucked 26 miles to the company mill at Darby which utilized sizing and heavy-media separation. Metallurgical-grade fluorspar processed by the company was shipped to industrial consumers.

Gypsum. - Estimated production of crude gypsum was slightly less than the 1963 total. Output was from the Shoemaker mine of United States Gypsum Co. and the Hanover mine of Ideal Cement Co., both in Fergus County.

<u>Lime</u>. - Lime production increased 5 percent over the 1963 total. The Anaconda Company made quicklime in Deer Lodge County for metallurgical use at its own operations, and Elliston Lime Co. manufactured lime in Powell County for industrial use. Three sugar companies, operating their own kilns, calcined limestone to quicklime for use in refining sugar in Big Horn, Missoula, Richland, and Yellowstone Counties.

Phosphate Rock. - According to preliminary data, output and value of marketable phosphate rock increased 12 percent over the 1963 totals.

Initial output was recorded for the Douglas Creek mine flotation plant, Granite County, by Montana Phosphate Products Co. Low-grade rock from the Douglas Creek mine was upgraded at the 300,000-ton-annual-capacity plant to a concentrate containing 31 percent P_2O_5 which was shipped to fertilizer manufacturing plants at Trail and Kimberley, British Columbia.

Rock of suitable grade for use as mined was produced by Montana Phosphate Products Co. and George Relyea in Powell County. Montana Phosphate Products Co. shipped material mined in Powell County to fertilizer plants in Canada, and Relyea shipped material to industrial consumers in the Rocky Mountain area.

Mitchell, Ronald J. Permanente Plant - New Montana Bonanza. Rock Products Mining & Processing, v. 67, No. 2, February 1964, pp. 57-62.

Phosphate rock from mines in Silver Bow County was washed and reduced to elemental phosphorus by the Victor Chemical Works, Division of Stauffer Chemical Co., at Silver Bow. Rock was treated thermally without reduction to make defluorinated animal feed phosphate products by Rocky Mountain Phosphate, Inc., at Garrison. Late in the year the Garrison plant was shut down because of litigation over alleged company responsibility for air pollution in the area.

Sand and Gravel and Stone. - Combined tonnage and value of sand and gravel and stone declined 6 percent from the 20.4 million tons produced in 1963 which was valued at \$20.8 million. The decline was due to smaller requirements for these commodities by the State highway department and at the Bureau of Reclamation Yellowtail dam project.

Pacific Silica Co. leased the Basin silica deposit, Jefferson County, from Union Carbide Co. and began developing the property. Crushed material was marketed to Pacific Northwest consumers.

Montana Travertine Quarries, Inc., marketed white, ivory, yellow, rosetan, and coral-colored travertine from quarries in Park County. The travertine was hand-slabbed at quarries near Gardner and trucked to the Gardner railhead for shipment to Midwestern States and Pacific coast building material consumers.

<u>Sulfur</u>. Output of high-purity elemental sulfur by Montana Sulphur & Chemical Co., contingent upon oil-refining operations of Continental Oil Co. and Humble Oil & Refining Co., was up 15 percent compared with 1963 production. Due to capacity expansion at the two petroleum refineries, facilities also were added to the sulfur-producing plant to recover additional sulfur.

Talc. - Quantity and value of talc production did not change, according to preliminary estimates. Talc was mined in Beaverhead County by Tri-State Minerals, Inc., and in Madison County by Sierra Talc & Chemical Co., Division of Cyprus Mines Corp. (formerly Sierra Talc Co.).

In addition to processing fine material in standard roller-type grinding mills, both companies produced micronized talc in fluid-energy mills to particle sizes ranging from 20 to less than 1 micron.

Vermiculite. The quantity of crude vermiculite mined declined compared with 1963 output. The Zonolite Division, W.R. Grace & Co., open pit near Libby, Lincoln County, continued to be the principal domestic source of vermiculite.

Material was selectively mined from 20-foot benches and trucked to a transfer point for distribution of waste and ore before shipment by conveyor to the mill. At the transfer point, waste passed over screens to a disposal area and material passing through screens fell through an 85-foot inclined

shaft and was transported 1,200 feet on a 24-inch belt conveyor to mill feed bins. At the mill, waste was scalped from the vermiculite by means of a dry-and wet-milling circuit; both circuits utilized gravity concentrating methods. Some of the upgraded material was exfoliated by a company in Great Falls; however, most was shipped out of the State for processing.

MINERAL FUELS

<u>Coal.</u>- Output of bituminous coal and lignite totaled 335,000 tons, compared with production of 343,000 tons in 1963. Bituminous coal was mined principally in Musselshell County; mines in Richland County were the major source of lignite, which was used in the Montana-Dakota Utilities Co. steamelectric generating plant at Sidney.

Petroleum and Natural Gas. - Estimated recovery of crude oil was 30.8 million barrels valued at \$74.8 million, compared with output of 30.9 million barrels valued at \$75.3 million in 1963. Withdrawals of natural gas increased to 31 billion cubic feet valued at \$2.4 million, compared with a total of 30.0 billion cubic feet valued at \$2.3 million in 1963.

Drilling through October (November-December data are not available) totaled 316 wells, 26 wells more than in the comparable 1963 period; of this total, 112 yielded oil, 11 yielded gas, and 193 were dry holes.

As a result of the Fred and George Creek and Flat Coulee successes in northern Montana, there was increased exploration in that area. The most extensive drilling program in the State was near the Fred and George Creek field in Toole County where more than 55 wells were completed through October; some were producers, and others were failures.

Renewed activity in northeastern Montana in Sheridan and Roosevelt Counties led to successful completion of three Devonian discoveries. Amerada Petroleum Corp., while reworking a former Silurian producer in the Outlook field (Sheridan County), completed the well for a flow of 263 barrels of oil per day from the Duperow formation (Devonian). Further drilling apparently yielded one successful offset producer from the same formation. Murphy Oil Co. in Roosevelt County completed a discovery well flowing 145 barrels of oil and 60 barrels of water per day from the Nisku formation (Devonian). The discovery, the most westerly success in the Williston basin, was named Volt field; development work was underway. A discovery was completed from two zones in the Nisku formation (Devonian) by Murphy Oil Co. north of Tule Creek field in Roosevelt County, and reportedly a Devonian pool was discovered south of the Tule Creek field.

In eastern Montana, Pan American Petroleum Corp. completed a Devonian discovery about 16 miles north of the Deer Creek field on the Cedar Creek anticline in Dawson County.

In central Montana, north of Columbus in Stillwater County, rework of a failure abandoned in 1934 led to a 10-million-cubic-foot-per-day gas producer from a Cretaceous subsurface structure. In Musselshell County, Occidental Petroleum Corp. completed an Amsden formation (Pennsylvanian) discovery on the Pole Creek anticline.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. announced it would install a hydrocracking unit and additional water control equipment at its Billings refinery.

Continental Oil Co. in February put on stream units that would increase capacity of its Billings refinery from 15,300 barrels per day to 35,500 barrels per day. A products pipeline was completed by the company from the Billings refinery to Casper and Sinclair, Wyo. At Casper, the pipeline had access to the Wyco pipeline to Denver, Colo., and at Sinclair, the pipeline connected with the Pioneer pipeline to Salt Lake City, Utah.

This report summarizes mineral industry activity in Montana in 1964 and contains preliminary production data for the year as estimated from company monthly and quarterly production canvasses, smelter receipt reports, and information contained in industry publications. Final production totals for the State's mineral commodities will be published in mid-1965 after completion of canvasses of all mineral industry establishments.


